

Did you know that you have the right to refuse to dissect animals in Hawaii?

It's true! Each year, 10 million animals (including frogs, cats, and fetal pigs) are cruelly killed and then cut up in classrooms across the country—even though humane alternatives exist. Studies have shown that students who use alternatives to dissection perform just as well as—if not better than—students who cut up animals. You don't have to dissect animals! Explain to your teacher that you won't be dissecting and that state policy [Hawaii Department of Education Regulation 2210.1] gives you the right to say no to cutting up animals in Hawaii. The policy reads:

Parents/legal guardians may ask in writing that their child be excluded from a specific lesson or activity and be provided an alternate learning activity. [Hawaii Department of Education Regulation 2210.1]

Dissection is unnecessary and cruel. Stand up for animals, and exercise your rights. Choose not to dissect.
